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1. Task description

This deliverable **2.3 Short Report on Open Days** is link to the task 2.3 led by FIAB about Pilots and Open Days (M9-M13). The task aimed to implement the training designed in T2.2 to address the urgent skill needs identified in T2.1 in each country and to organize Open days with the industries to facilitate further take-up. Sector representatives organized the Open Days in collaboration with national/local industries to disseminate the courses and link VET/HEI with industry.

These days were foreseen in the EU in similar months, in order to allow for a broad dissemination of the events. Finally, partners celebrated their Open Days in the frame of most relevant conferences and fairs identified in each country (e.g. Cibus and Ecomondo Fairs, Italy; Alimentaria Barcelona Fair, Spain, etc.) and by groups choosing the same months. Italy and Portugal celebrated their Open Days in November 2023, other countries like Spain, The Netherlands, Austria and Greece during February and March of 2024. France postponed its Open Day identifying the most interesting date October 2024 to celebrate it in the frame of the Fair SIAL Paris. Romania joined this Open Days organization by celebrating its by April 2024 in the frame of General Assembly of the European Board of Veterinary Specialization.

The participants of the open days also collaborated to fill up the survey from Task 3.3.

Each event was organized either during internal events or external initiatives such as conferences, innovation prize/awards, Ecotrophelia, International Fairs, and had one part of modular training, one visit to the company and one part of presentation of the I-RESTART activities to reskill and upskill people in the agrifood and veterinary sector.

At the open days a minimum of 10 people per VET/HEI training center participated, for a total of 80 participants in 8 countries, with the collaboration of the following partners:

- **Spain**: FIAB, CTAEX, UMU and SCOOP.
- Italy: CONFAGRI, UNITO, FEDERALIMENTARE and INFOR. (2 OPEN DAYS)
- The Netherlands: AERES and WUR.
- Austria: ISEKI and LVA.
- **Greece**: AKMI and SEVT.
- France: ANIA.
- Portugal: CONFAGRI PORTUGAL.
- Romania: European Board of Veterinary Specialization EBVS.

After the national Open Days took place, each partner responsible sent FIAB a short report describing main activities, attendees, date and location, pictures of the event and posts on social media related, among other extra information.

This deliverable is the final report on the Open Days made by FIAB.



2. Executive Summary

The I-RESTART project aims at reskilling and upskilling the workforce in the agri-food and veterinary sectors, retraining the employees leaving the heavy industry to hire them in the agri-food sector, and engaging with students that want to enter the agri-food labour market to improve their digital skills and facilitate the transition to the Green Deal initiative. To reach the above-mentioned objectives, I-RESTART will facilitate the inter-sectoral and intergenerational skills transfers through the adoption of an innovative micro-credential's methodology and the work-based learning experiences which on the one hand will provide inclusive, flexible and engaging work-based patterns with mentors and on the other will open the ecosystem also to external workers. The project will provide the tools to tackle future challenges with the offering of 10 occupational profiles for a total of 3200 hours of training. In total 16 trainers and 200 trainees will benefit from the pilot training, and 40 students will complete the work-based learning scheme that also includes the advanced entrepreneurial skills. The 27 partners consortium from 11 countries will identify skills needed and gaps, create occupational profiles, detailed curricula, design European strategies and 10 country roadmaps to reflect the country's needs while keeping EU quality standards (ESCO, EQAVET) to address the mobility of learners through Europe.

One of the objectives of this project is to cover the urgent skill needs at EU level and carry out in the first year of the project the initial pilots to have feedback with the training needs. Since the I-RESTART aim is to provide inclusive and innovative training, the pilots were led by VET providers and stakeholder associations in 'AgriFood Industry Open Days' at the food processors/farm level. They were intended to occur possibly in the same month of the year to allow massive dissemination of the events, but finally we scheduled two periods, November 2023 and February-March 2024 in order to suit all partners preferences and capacities, and to make them in the framework of a high impact fair or event.

I-RESTART project objectives are related to providing strategy and actions to reskill and upskill people in the following sectors:

- 1- Food Industry
- 2- Primary Production
- 3- Veterinary Sector

The competencies explained during Open Day sessions were:

- Sustainability and Bioeconomy
- Digitalization
- Entrepreneurship
- Specific trends per sector
- One-health

3. Mirco-credentials

The micro-credentials have been identified as a significant element in the European Education Area, as indicated by the EU Skills Agenda Action 10 "A European approach to micro-credentials" is among the



EU tools and initiatives that support lifelong learning (European Commission, 2020).

Alternative forms of education are becoming increasingly popular and skill-based careers are replacing degrees in some industries.

The project uses a different approach in the training methodology, not creating full training contents but relying on smaller, shorter modules (micro-credentials) to tackle the skills gaps, in line with the EU Skills Agenda.

Micro-credentials provide great flexibility to the HEI and VET Providers, that can include either offering the training material in a form of complete course or can add it to a certified course they are offering at local level. This flexibility boosts the potential to exploit the material for upskilling or reskilling of the workforce. The project builds up a framework to certify the micro-credentials with the engagement of local certification agencies.

4. National Open Days report

4.1. General Overview

The Agrifood Industry (AFI) Open Days were organized by Agrifood and Food Industry Federations during their daily own main events - either internal such as Assemblies and Committees or external such as Conferences, Innovation Awards/Prizes, International Fairs with the aim to present their best practices but also to host the pilots/workshops with the help of the trainers and the experiences of the agrifood chain operators/companies.

The skills proposed during the design phase of the pilots were chosen in these areas, suggested by I-RESTART partners:

Digital tools, digital marketing, cybersecurity, AI, website build, e-commerce platform, e-mailing campaign know-how, sales strategy, exports, new aspects in food safety, technology, processing, logistics, quality control, process optimization, engineering, auditing, animal wellness, veterinary activities, the food system, agriculture policy, circular agriculture, biodiversity, future farming, minerals cycle and accounting, regional/ national programmes and subsidies, entrepreneurial mindset and effectuation, opportunity recognition, business modelling for impact-driven ventures and entrepreneurial finance.

4.2. Open Day - Spain

20th March 2024 (FIAB, CTAEX, UMU, SCOOP) – Alimentaria Barcelona, Spain

Planning and Organization





The Spanish Open Day was planned for the second week of March 2024, in the framework of the international fair Alimentaria Barcelona. The major trade show platform for the food and beverage, foodservice and hospitality equipment industry celebrated an edition marked by international participation and business that has once again brought together the entire sector and advanced the industry's main lines and trends. Parallel sessions were developed during the four days of fair, where representatives from the Food Industry mainly, but also from Primary Production and Hospitality sector, presented their innovations and reinforced the networking with other chain actors.

FIAB created an agenda for the ALIBER sessions organized during Alimentaria Barcelona and invited stakeholders to attend.

The session started at 10:30 with a warm welcoming from FIAB, where Concha Ávila, Head of European Projects, presented the participants and explained the aim of the Open Day. Afterwards, Gabriela Alcat, Project Manager at FIAB, gave an overview of previous FIELDS project and I-RESTART project, presented the aims and explained the methodology of the Focus Groups and the 3 sectors represented. Planning and Organization

The Italian Open Day was celebrated the 8th of November 2023, in the framework of the Ecomondo 2023 - The Green Technology Expo, that took place in Rimini, Italy. Ecomondo is a key event for green and circular economy. It's the meeting place where industrial groups, stakeholders, policy makers, opinion leaders, local authorities, research bodies and institutions come together and put in place the key elements that define the strategies for the development of EU environmental policy.

During the event, 2 different sessions were organized by Confagricoltura and INFOR. Confagricoltura created an agenda for both sessions to invite people to participate.




Figure 10. Italian Open Day shared in social media.

24th October 2023 (FEDERALIMENTARE) – Cibus Tec, Fiere di Parma, Italy "The future of agrifood: sustainability, one health and new technologies".

Planning and Organization

The second Italian Open Day organised by Federalimentare was celebrated on October 24th, 2024, in the framework of **CIBUS TEC Exhibition** (Parma, 24-27 Oct 2023), the key event for technology innovations for the agrifood sector, where the actors of food & beverage supply chain, policy makers, authorities, research centres and stakeholders can meet to evaluate next challenges and draw an outlook of current context of food tech.

Federalimentare organized the event "**The future of agrifood: sustainability, one health and new technologies**", involving main representatives of food industry, food technologists and experts in agrifood research. In fact, after a brief introduction of the President of Federalimentare, important speakers took the floor to deepen important topics, such as the role of food technologies to increase the sustainability level of our productions; in addition, an interesting focus was made about the three pillars of sustainability, that are economic, social and environmental, as vital factor for always more sustainable future. To continue, as this topic is gaining momentum nowadays, an overview of the opportunities deriving from genome editing in agrifood sector was given to let stakeholders understand





the great potential of this kind of genetic improvement. Moreover, the event was the occasion to embrace, in a one health approach, other two important topics relevant for food industry: traceability and blockchain. Last but not least, a deep presentation of I-Restart EU Project was given, as its objectives are fully in line with the scope of the event.

I-RESTART promo material was shared during and after the conference, as Project presentation really impressed stakeholders present at the event.

Almost 30 participants were registered.

Feedback & Survey response

Before closing the Open Day, a survey was disseminated through QR code among participants, gathering 24 anonymous feedback. The majority of the respondents agreed that topics covered were crucial for the future of agrifood, and some of them, such as the one health approach should be further deepened and embraced.

4.5. Open Day – Austria

8th of April 2024 (LVA) – Food Industry Representative's Meeting in Klosterneuburg

Planning and Organization





An agreement has been reached with the management of a leading Austrian company in the food sector to include the open days into their general meeting of food industry experts. This ensured the participation of highly qualified members representing various backgrounds.

Participants

The participants consisted of 7 lecturers with different fields of expertise relevant for the food industry and around 70 professionals working in the food sector. Fields of expertise include the dairy-, meat-, and produce industries, as well as related fields such as food enhancing agents, pest management, regulatory frameworks, food contact material management, quality management, etc.

Feedback & Survey response

Feedback was gathered at the end of the presentation.



The audience agreed on digitalization, understanding new technologies, and openness to change as a central point of future development in the food industry. It was seen as highly imperative for higher competitiveness of the Austrian industry on the global market.

Sustainability was seen as an important issue, but also as something which has already been discussed in deep enough detail. Information on sustainable strategies can already be gathered from many different sources, and awareness is seen to be at an all time high. However, implementation of sustainable practices is seldomly discussed and information on the execution of sustainable strategies is missing.

4.6. Open Day – Greece

11th March 2024 (SEVT and AKMI) – FOOD EXPO GREECE 2024

Planning and Organization

On Monday 11th March, the I-Restart project was spotlighted at <u>FOOD EXPO Greece</u>! Organized by SEVT - Federation of Hellenic Food Industries and <u>UNIVERSAL EDUCATION</u>, this open day was an excellent opportunity not only to share the project and the improvements made during the training activities, but above all to demonstrate its impact on stakeholders in the Food Industry and Academia.

4.7. Open Day – Portugal

16th November 2023 (CONFAGRI PT)



Planning and Organization

To plan the organization of the Open Days, CONFAGRI contacted some Agrifood Cooperatives, focusing in some of them that have a certified training department. At the same time, they publicized the event through social networks, ensuring that it is an event truly open to all interested parties. The Open days included also a networking lunch for participants.

They contacted agro-industrial cooperative organisations with certified training departments to participate and contribute to the topics to be covered. As a result of these contacts, they involved the National Authority for Animal Health and Food (DGAV - General Directorate for Food and Veterinary) to address the issue of compulsory training in animal health, under the European Animal Health Law (Reg. (EU) 2016/429), for all professionals who work with livestock. The Law brings clearer responsibilities for farmers (livestock, fish and shellfish farms) and other people involved (e.g. vets) regarding early detection in order to prevent major disease outbreaks or prevent diseases from spreading to limit their damage.

The final programme, in addition to including the subject of the courses already developed in the FIELDS project and the training materials made available, as well as the I-Restart project and the skills needs that are currently being assessed, also included the subject of animal health training for producers and veterinary staff.

✤ Participants

Number of participants per VET/HEI training centre was 24 in total, from 11 local organizations.

The workforce involved were diverse. The responsible and employees in the training department of the organizations, advisors of the farmers that deliver their production in the agri-food organizations, some trainers and members of the administration.

Feedback & Survey response

Some of the highlights of participant feedback during the events were: the difficulty of older farmers and owners of small agro industries in responding to current and future demands to produce food; Also, the difficulty that occurred in Portugal in obtaining financing for training was also mentioned (it was a situational situation hoping that it will be overcome in 2024); Last but not least, the lack of available trainers was highlighted, considering that most livestock producers must have training, within the scope of the European ANIMAL HEALTH Law.

The urgent and innovative skills identified by participants during the survey were:

- 1. The need of skills in digitalization.
- 2. The need of skills in the use of data from remote sensors (satellite).
- 3. The need of skills in animal welfare.
- 4. The need of skills animal feed efficiency (climate change).

The survey was promoted, but we do not know the results of the participants in the open days, because the answers were submitted anonymously.

4.8 Open Day – Romania

Planning and Organization

The I-RESTART Open Day was integrated into the annual General Assembly of the European Board of Veterinary Specialisation (EBVS) held at the University of Agricultural Sciences and Veterinary Medicine of Cluj-Napoca, Romania, on April 12th. To ensure broader engagement, online participation options were extended to the public, facilitated through invitations disseminated across EBVS social media platforms (LinkedIn, Facebook, Instagram) as well as via email to I-RESTART partners and the EBVS Community.








Figure 20. Invitation on EBVS Social Media (Instagram and LinkedIn).

Participants

The EBVS General Assembly convened representatives from each of the 27 European veterinary specialty colleges affiliated with EBVS, alongside guests from prominent organizations within the veterinary domain: the Federation of Veterinarians of Europe (FVE), the AVMA Veterinary Specialty Committee (VSOC), and the Veterinary Continuous Education in Europe (VetCEE). Altogether 47 participants.

The session was chaired by members of the EBVS Executive Committee: Zoe Polizopoulou, Gonçalo da Graça Pereira, Raphaël Guatteo, along with EBVS CEO Julie Rosser and EBVS Director of Education Mark Bowen.

Presenters shared The Training Outline presentation, centered on the prioritization of materials to be developed by the consortium. Key areas identified for content development most relevant for the EBVS members included data literacy, clinical statistics, including big data and AI. A second module will be developed around skills for business, including communication skills. The third priority will be around responsible medicines and chemical use that will include content in antimicrobial resistance, use of biocides and their alternatives. Notably, the production of high-quality video content was emphasized to elucidate concepts within these domains. Printed leaflets elucidating the project's scope were distributed among participants to facilitate further understanding.

4.8. Open Day – France

6th March 2025 (ANIA) – CFIA, Rennes, France

Planning and Organization

CFIA in Rennes, Western France, is a major technological fair for food companies looking for innovative solutions. It gathers 2 000 exhibitors of machines and ingredients across 50,000 square meters of exhibition space. For this 28th edition, the fair welcomed 23 600 national and international visitors. Environmental, social, and economic challenges are addressed through themed activities and conferences that complement the exhibition, aligning with today's major issues and future challenges.

On March 6th, Ania held a conference titled "Research and Training, two main drivers of food industry competitiveness". First, Ariane Voyatzakis, Head of innovation at ANIA, presented new technologies to lower carbon impact of food industry. Then, she highlighted the content of I-restart training and gave



the next steps for pilot training. She invited students, employees, and trainers to visit the websites of FIELDS and I-RESTART projects and to contact her if wishing to engage in the pilot training.
